

THE Tau Beta Pi Fellowship Program



Now in its 87th year, the Fellowship Program recognizes and supports outstanding members who plan to pursue graduate education that advances the engineering profession. Tau Beta Pi plans to award more than 25 fellowships this year. In 2019, 36 members received fellowships from 339 applicants.

Fellowships are awarded on the basis of scholarship, leadership and service, and the promise of substantial achievement. Applicants are asked to discuss motivation and preparation for advanced study and how their career goals advance the interest of the engineering profession. Strong faculty recommendations are an integral component to the application.

Applications are welcome from members or candidates for membership who will be initiated by May 1.

- Applications are **available** beginning December 10.
- Deadline is 11:59 P.M. EST February 1.
- Recommendations are due 11:59 P.M. EST February 8.
- Fellowships are restricted to initiated members.
- BS/MS dual degree students are not eligible to apply for a fellowship.
- Applications will be completed online; paper applications WILL NOT be accepted.
- Fellows are awarded \$10,000 in ten monthly payments beginning in August.

Fellowships will be announced May 1. Fellows will receive \$10,000 payable in ten monthly increments beginning August 15, 2020.

Fellows may enroll in graduate programs in any field which enables them to

contribute to the engineering profession. Awardees are required to submit a report summarizing their work at the completion of the fellowship year.
